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## Annual Report 2007-08

Since its inception in 1980, the Tarabai Trust has helped serve the poorest of the poor. As another eventful year comes to an end, we take pride in presenting to you the achievements of the trust.

### Mobile Eye Camp Unit

Through its Mobile Outreach Programme, the Tarabai Trust strives to serve the underserved by conducting free rural eye operation camps and treating a large number of poor rural patients in various parts of Rajasthan. The mobile outreach unit of the hospital visits pre-selected sites and organizes an outpatient clinic on the first day of the camp. All patients in the clinic are treated free of cost. Surgical cases are selected from outdoor patients, admitted and operated the next day. Each camp lasts five days to a week. On the last day, patients are discharged and the mobile outreach unit travels to the next destination for the eye camp. The mobile unit also organizes Inreach camps, where patients are screened at a rural location and then brought by bus to the base hospital at Jodhpur for surgery.



In this year we organized **72 major free eye camps** spread over four Districts of Rajasthan. Twenty-one of these were Outreach camps with onsite surgery and the rest were Inreach camps. Details of campsites and surgery can be found in Table 1, which is appended at the end of this report. In these eye camps **19,703 patients were examined** and treated free of cost. A total of **2337 free eye operations** were performed, almost all of which were for cataract, the leading cause of blindness in our country. The total number of free operations performed was more than last year. The highest number of operations [113] was performed at Bagri Nagar in Pali district. All patients were operated by microsurgery and all of them received an artificial lens implant (IOL). This has been possible through the experience gained through the years and the unique *esprit de corps* of our team. Almost all of the Inreach cases were performed by the phacoemulsification technique. The **Japanese Embassy** has donated a phacoemulsification machine to us and it's because of their generous gift that we are able to offer this quality surgery free of cost to the indigent for the past several years. A breakdown of surgery performed in the eye camps is described below.

This year we have the pleasure of reporting that several pediatric cataract cases were operated in our eye camps in which our timely surgical intervention has helped change the lives of the children. Our surgical technique in pediatric cataract surgery has become refined and gives better qualitative results. One greatly satisfying case is that of 8-year-old Amin the son of Salim, an impoverished fruit vendor. Salim ply's his pushcart all day long on the streets of Jodhpur. He earns about Rs. 50 after a day's toil. Sometimes when he is lucky he earns Rs. 100 a day. There is no way he could afford his son's surgery. Amin had poor vision since birth. He studied in school until class I, after which he left school because he could not cope up with studies due to his blindness. His RE was operated in the town of Ahmedabad, a year ago in a charitable eye hospital. With only one good eye, Amin had great difficulty in studying and finding his way about in the nighttime. He often suffered from falls in the night because of his poor sight and could not recognize objects. His father could not afford surgery in Jodhpur and waited until our free eye camp was announced in the Housing Board colony. We operated his LE and he has recovered good vision. Six weeks after surgery his vision in the eye is better than 6/12 and has returned to school.

How blindness affects patients psychologically is graphically exemplified by two of our camp patients, both of whom live below the poverty line. The first is Murad an 85-year-old Muslim man who was blind in both eyes with cataract. He was leading a vegetative existence. Blinded for two years he sat in a corner of his hut, ignored by family and oblivious to household and village life. His legs, feet and nail beds, were covered with fungus infection, but he wasn't bothered. He had nothing to look forward to and was just waiting to die. He told us haltingly that his children could not afford surgery for him so he had given up thinking about it. He just took everyday as it came, never making demands on his family and being thankful that they at least fed him. He was quietly bidding his time for death, the grim reaper, to come to him and deliver him from his miserable existence. This was when someone from his village informed the family about our outreach camp at Barmer and his son brought him for surgery. We operated his RE and he is a seeing man once more. He says that he will now die a happy man having seen the faces of his grandchildren and once again interacting with family and friends.



The other case is 60-year-old Madho Singh who lost his left leg due to gangrene 6 years ago. He now had cataract in BE, more pronounced in the RE. He was already dependent on crutches to walk and even then he could not negotiate steps and the rough terrain and sandy tracts in his village. Now for a year he had blurred vision and was finding it very difficult to go from one place to another independently. He had a belligerent attitude and talked with us very roughly. His son apologized for his behavior and informed us that his mental make up had changed sine he went blind a few months ago. He felt that life was not treating him kindly and therefore spewed his ire at everyone. On the operating table also the angry old man was shouted his way through surgery. But on the second day of dressing he was the quietest person in the hall and smiled for the first time in months. His vision 48 hours after surgery was 6/12 and six weeks later he was a perfect 6/6. In the picture you can see him going home, his son helping him negotiate the steps and his wife holding his shoes.



## Tarabai Desai Eye Hospital

The base eye hospital is a modern institution equipped with the latest diagnostic and therapeutic equipment. Its non-profit services are available to a wide cross section of the population. A small registration fee is charged which remains valid for a period of a month. In this financial year a total of 20,261 new patients were examined and treated at the hospital. From these new outpatients cases 1597 patients (8%) were examined and treated without charging registration fee. In addition, 6274 old cases coming for follow-up were also examined and treated. All follow-up cases are examined free of cost. Thus a total of **26,538 new and follow-up cases were treated** at the hospital in this financial year.

The surgical productivity has been excellent in this financial year due to the dedication of a caring and committed staff. The hospital has two microsurgical units in the Operation Rooms, which ensures that all operations are performed under microscope, which meant better results and shorter stay in the hospital. In this financial year, 588 eye operations were performed at the hospital [including 439 Cataract and 29 Glaucoma surgeries]. Details of OPD and surgery statistics can be found in Table 2, which is appended at the end of this report. Almost all cataracts were operated by the technique of phacoemulsification, which is the state - of - the - art suture less technique of cataract surgery. Affordable eye care is the guiding principle at the hospital and therefore all surgical treatment is provided at a non-profit cost to patients.

Our specialty services saw resurgence with several congenital cataract and squint cases being operated this year. Baby Nikita a 3-month-old girl is a case in point. Born with cataract in both eyes, her family sustains life by begging. They were in Jodhpur for a religious fair, when they were spotted by a member of a service club and brought to us. She was operated successfully in both eyes.



Vinod is a 22-year-old boy, who was finding it difficult to find a soul mate because he was one eyed and the blind eye was so disfigured that he hated to even look at himself in the mirror. The left eye had been blinded in childhood and over the years the socket had contracted so much that it was impossible to fit an artificial eye. He underwent an oculopalstic procedure whereby a mucous membrane graft taken from his mouth and was grafted in the eye to fashion a new inferior fornix that could hold an artificial eye. A happy and Vinod found a bride and was

married soon after. Like wise Heeraram, a 27-year-old man who was involved in a road accident had severely disfiguring scar across his face, which had scarred and shortened his right eyelid. The eyelid was shortened and could not open. The patient was operated and tissue taken from his ear was grafted to solve the problem. These cases have been cited because oculoplastic surgery is not available anywhere else in Jodhpur, and these patients could not afford surgery at higher centers in Delhi or elsewhere. We are proud that they gained social acceptance after being operated here.

## Volunteers

Several volunteer eye surgeons visit us from time to time to perform high volume - high quality cataract / other surgery. This year we had several top class volunteer surgeons from **USA** [Dr. Lenny Friedman, SEE International, pictured on the right], **Chile** [Dr. Miguel Pacheco], **Holland** [Dr. Sarit Oberstein, picture bottom right] and **UK** [Dr. Joseph Keenan, Dr. Samira Anwar, pictured bottom left]. All the visiting surgeons gave a helping hand



in overcoming the surgical volumes and shared their knowledge, experience, techniques and thoughts with our staff. Medical student volunteers from USA [Alex Farat, Anuradha Mishra and Deborah pink] were sponsored by **Unite for Sight**, US and they stayed one month to conduct school vision screening. On the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> of October a Pediatric Ophthalmology and a Retina Diagnostics camp was organized. These are super-speciality camps and such camps were organized for the first time in the state of Rajasthan. There was an overwhelming turnover of patients from small babies with childhood eye problems and the aged with retinal problems. In the specialty camps 102 patients were examined and treated. Several cases with diabetic retinopathy underwent laser treatment at subsidized cost.



## Super-specialty Camps : Pediatrics & Retina Clinics

This year two free super-specialty camps were organized at the hospital. This is the first time that superspeciality camps were organized in Jodhpur division. The Paediatric Ophthalmology camp was organised on 17<sup>th</sup> and the Vitreo-Retinal Camp was organised on 18<sup>th</sup> October 2007. Both camps were there were very busy with an unexpected number of cases. The Paediatric ophthalmology camp [37 children registered] was very varied and interesting. Cases ranged from simple accommodation type squints to nystagmus, congenital cataract, inherited retinal disorders, and traumatic injury. One 6-month-old baby girl was operated for cataract free of charge at the camp. Vitreo-retinal disorders [65] seen the next day were mixed including advanced diabetic retinopathy and complex detachment. Since we are not properly equipped for VR surgery, we referred the operable cases to appropriate centres.

## Laser Treatment Facility

Two of the most advanced laser systems for the treatment of Retinal diseases, After-cataract and Refractory glaucoma are installed at the hospital. The laser treatment is available to all at a

nominal cost only and free to the indigent. In this financial year we performed 103 laser treatments out of which 11 (10.7 %) were free of cost.

### Dr. Narendra Bhandari Orthoptics Clinic

The Dr. Bhandari Orthoptic clinic was started in 1999 with a generous donation from Dr. Narendra C. Bhandari of the USA. It offers non-profit orthoptic treatment by trained staff. A total of 258 children were given orthoptic exercises in the clinic in this financial year. Each child received 10 days or more of treatment at the clinic. Out of the 88 children 2 received free treatment.

### School Eye Health Appraisal Programme

A school eye check-up project was implemented in collaboration with the NSPB – Jodhpur and the Lions Club Jodhpur Jodhana. Started on July 6, the project was completed on August 2, 2006. The key personnel involved in the project were our ophthalmic assistants and medical student volunteers from Chicago, USA. The project was undertaken mostly in Govt. Schools where people from lower socio-economic rungs of society send their children. A complete list of the school is available at the end of this report [table 3]. The basic idea of the project was early detection of visual impairment and eye disease and prevention of blindness in the pediatric population. The project had the following components:

1. Screening for visual acuity, color vision defects, latent squint / convergence.
2. Anterior segment examination for eye diseases.
3. Refraction and dispensing spectacles.
4. Follow up care at Tarabai Desai Eye Hospital.
5. Eye Healthy Education.
6. Impact assessment.

A total of 5660 children were brought under the wings of this project and examined thoroughly. From them about one fourth [955 children] had eye problems [16.8 %] and were referred to the base hospital either for treatment or mostly for refraction. From the referred population only 197 children [20.6 %] were compliant with follow up and were given free glasses.

In all schools a talk on eye health care was delivered at the end of the clinic, so that children could learn how to protect their eyes. In 3 schools in addition to the above-mentioned ones, special multimedia presentations rounded up with an eye care quiz were arranged.

In a separate activity, school vision screening was also conducted at Varun Baal Bharti school where 52 children were examined and treated in the month of October.

## Tele-ophthalmology Project Started


A Telemedicine project has been started by the Govt. of Rajasthan and Indian Space Research Organisation [ISRO] to benefit rural communities. Our hospital has been selected as an expert center for providing ophthalmology consultation to 19-village resource centers [VRC's] spread all over the state. The hospital has been linked via satellite to these centers with the aim of providing consultations and eye health education. The project was started on September 22, 2007. In the first year of the project **114 patients** have been examined in **21 tele-ophthalmology sessions**. The range of patients seen in a session is 1 to 17 cases per session. The common diagnosis made are cataract, refractive error, corneal ulcer, mucopurulent conjunctivitis and allergic conjunctivitis. Spectacle correction at base hospital has been given to 11 patients and 7 indigent patients with cataract have been operated free of cost. An offshoot of liaison with the VRC's has been that on-site free cataract surgery camps have been organized at two VRC's.



## Scientific & Training Activity

1. **EVRTS** : Dr. Sanjiv Desai underwent 15 days of specialized training at Bremen, Germany in May-June. The EVRTS course is designed to hone surgical skills and is considered the best such course in the world. There were participants from 24 countries around the world in this course. He was part sponsored by the course organisers. Picture on the right shows him training on a surgical simulator, which is one of a kind machine.
2. **Skills transfer in Ghana** : Dr. Sanjiv Desai went to Ghana as a Unite for Sight volunteer to impart training to local doctor in Small incision cataract surgery for a period of a fortnight in June. He transferred skills to Dr. Seth Wanye of the Tamale Eye Clinic through hospital & camp based eye surgery. Picture shows both surgeons operating together.
3. **Glaucoma CME** : On September the 2<sup>nd</sup> a CME [Continuing Medical Education] programme on Glaucoma was organized at the hospital. They key note speaker was Dr. Sood from Delhi.



4. **Pediatric Ophthalmology CME** : This was organized on 20<sup>th</sup> of October. Dr.Sarit Oberstein, Dr. Sameera Bhati and Dr. Sanjiv Desai made presentations on squint, uveitis and oculoplasty. All members of the Jodhpur Ophthalmic society attended the CME.
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5. **Optometry CME** : this was organized on 10<sup>th</sup> of December. Dr. Gillian Rudduck a senior optometrist from UK was the keynote speaker. She spoke about "Basic Refraction Principles & Prescribing for Children" and on "Development of Vision". Other topics covered were "Autorefractors" and "Toric Contact Lenses" by local speakers.
  6. **Scientific Paper** : A paper on SICS training at Ghana titled "Expedition to Ghana" was presented at the Rajasthan Ophthalmic Society meeting at Bikaner.
  7. **Oculaoplasty Symposium** : Dr. Sanjiv Desai participated in the symposium at Hyderabad as a delegate.

## Medicines to Ghana

During his stint as a volunteer in Ghana, Dr.Sanjiv Desai realized that there was a lack of basic medicines there. Even simple eye surgery was very difficult in that situation. So our hospital decided to gift essential medical supplies to the Eye Clinic, Tamale Teaching Hospital. The gift include pre and post operative drops good for about **300 cataract surgeries**, books and CD's as well as a choice of instruments. The Ghana Embassy in Delhi helped to transport the supplies free of cost to Ghana. The Rotary Club of Jodhpur paid for transportation to Delhi. Pix on the left shows Divisional Commissioner, Jodhpur, inspecting the trunkful of medicines, surgical CD's and books before they were sent.



## New Wing at the hospital

In order to increase the scope and quantum of services, building work on a new annex was started this year. Its major funders are the **Four Acre Trust** and the **UK Friends of the Tarabai Desai Eye Hospital**. Built over a plinth area of 4500 sq.ft, it will be a four-storey structure which will provided much needed space to improve traffic flow and increased number of patients at the hospital. We are also hoping to start Retina specialty and Diabetic Retinopathy Clinic in the new wing.



## Public Education Activities

**1. Senior Citizen Glaucoma meet :** This was organized on August 24, 2007 at the Lachoo Memorial Colloge. Members of the Shastri Nagar Senior Citizens Forum attended this multi media presentation made by Dr. Sanjiv Desai. The function was opened by a welcome note by President Mr. BK Gaur. Demonstration of visual field defects in glaucoma was also done with the help of slides and a flip chart. Thanks was proposed by Mr. Gaj Raj. The meeting was attended by 35 people.



**2. Computer Vision Syndrome :** A public education meeting was arranged in collaboration with the Lions Club Jodhana on 6-10-07 on the important subject of Computer Vision Syndrome that is becoming a rampant nuisance all over the world. There was a gathering of over 50 people – members of the Lions Club as well as people from the public. Dr. Sanjiv Desai, presented a 15-minute multimedia show on the subject of Computer Vision Syndrome. This was followed by another 15 min presentation on Glaucoma titled “Kala Pani.” The talks were followed by discussion with the audience and many interesting questions were fielded.



**3. World Sight Day :** As in the previous years, we celebrated the World Sight Day 2007 on 11 October at Jodhpur with aplomb. The following activities were undertaken at Jodhpur.

**Rally for Sight :** A rally of 200 school children was organized as a means of creating awareness about eye care in the school as well as the masses. Children of Rotary School participated in the Rally. They were involved in writing slogans and making placards and banners, 3-4 days in advance. This pre-rally activity was a good educational opportunity for their teachers to interact with them and educate them on the importance of simple eye care. Rtn. Ashok Jain, President, Rotary Club of Jodhpur, flagged off the Rally from both schools at 9:30 AM. Carrying banners and chanting slogans, it made its way through the town and to the Naveen Shikshan Sansthan. The slogans written and chanted by the children were very interesting and roused a lot of interest in the streets [for example *Ankhon ko sambhalna Hai, Roshni bachana Hai* meaning, Take care of the Eyes, Save your Sight]. En route, children distributed handbills on “**Care of the Eyes**” to passers by and to the roadside shopkeepers. A sample of the handbills distributed is given in the picture on the right hand side. To boost the morale of the children, a contingent of teachers, Lions, Rotarians and members of the NSPB – Jodhpur marched with the children.



**"Netra Suraksha" Talk** : At the Naveen Shikshan Sansthan , children participating in the Rally, Lions, Rotarians and invited guests were addressed on the theme subject of **"Bachon Mein Netra Suraksha"** [Protection of Eyes in Children] by Dr. Sanjiv Desai, J. The talk focused on primary eye care and the prevention of blindness. Children were informed about the signs & symptoms of common eye diseases and how to prevent those diseases and avert blindness. A Q/A session was conducted to answer queries from children. This was followed by a **Quiz on eye care** in which several prizes were given away on the spot. The programme was greatly appreciated by students and teachers alike for the innovation and style of presentation and the interaction with the children. The programme was wound up by final comments and vote of thanks by Mr. S.M Mundra, Secretary Lions Club, Jodhana.



**Public Education Meet** : From 4 to 7 PM a multimedia presentation was organized at the Desert Destiny Hotel on the theme of Children's Vision. The press was also invited to this meeting so that they could propagate the theme message of the WSD amongst the laypublic. Dr. Sanjiv Desai gave a talk on the theme subject and then this was followed up by an educative presentation on **"Glaucoma - the Silent thief of Sight."** Handbills on eye care, and glaucoma prevention were distributed to the gathering on the spot. Questions were taken at the end of the talks and a very animated discussion followed. Press coverage of the event reached an estimated 1.5 million people of Jodhpur and surrounding areas. The two talks were also covered live on "24 Channel" and telecast on cable TV the same day and the next day. Newspaper coverage on the WSD activities are reproduced at the end of this report.



## **Our Benefactors**

We are fortunate to have had the support of many local, national and international benefactors in this year. Their generous help in cash or kind has helped us in continually providing quality services to the people of this region and to them we owe our heartfelt thanks.
